Ideas & Action – George P. Shultz

George Shultz was a Marine in the South Pacific during WWII, holds a Ph.D in Economics from MIT, has been Dean of the University of Chicago Graduate School of Business, President of an international corporation (Bechtel), and has held four cabinet posts. Few can claim such wideranging experience. George writes about the interplay of ideas and action in a book with reflections and advice that can apply to any person or situation. -*Free to Choose Network*

The Cold War: A New History – John Lewis Gaddis
